



London Play is 25!

We can't believe it either! In 2023 London Play marks a quarter of a century – making us the same age as Google. More than a few things have changed over the intervening years but London Play's mission remains the same: to make sure that London's children have the space, time and freedom to play.

We are looking ahead to the next 25 years with plenty of optimism. Our new three-year strategy was launched in April, charting a path for the future which will be responsive to the challenges of an ever shifting socio-political landscape; and aiming to centre the voices and needs of the children and communities who are the focus of our work.

We are already on our way. Here are just a few of the highlights from the past 12 months.

London's biggest play survey for a decade

As spring sprung we launched the results of the biggest survey of London play provision in a decade. To be honest, the findings didn't make for happy reading. Our research confirmed that six adventure playgrounds have closed under cover of the pandemic. And although some councils say they are investing in new playgrounds; many are not matching this with (revenue) spending on the staffing or maintenance costs that are vital to ensure they do not fall into neglect. This has only hardened our resolve to find more creative ways of supporting anyone and everyone committed to improving play for London's children.

London's Saddest Playground campaign

Our campaign to find Londons' Saddest Playground launched on 'Blue Monday' in January. It elicited a stream of images of burnt out, neglected and just plain tokenistic playgrounds across the capital which were put to public vote. The playgrounds deemed 'most in need of love' were Bromley's Crystal Palace Park playground and Leyton Square in Southwark; with Southall's Emerald Square close behind. London Play has been working alongside groups in these and other areas to support their efforts to influence local decision makers in favour of play. It is part of our **Communities Unite for Play** project funded by **Trust for London**. Hackney's **Shakespeare Walk Adventure Playground** took away the top prize in the 2023 London Adventure Play Awards over October half term. Around 200 children from 16 shortlisted London adventure playgrounds converged again on the Prince Charles Cinema in London's West End to watch the films they'd made about the places they love to play up on the big screen. Crazy games including a 'flickathon' and fashion show for playworkers kept the roof raised and the fun factor high. **Markfield**, **Triangle** and **Barnard** adventure playgrounds won category awards and runners up were **Pearson Street**, **Somerford Grove** and **Max Roach**. The seven winning playgrounds each received a small fund to support a community celebration over the coming months, as part of our new **Adventure Play for the Community** project funded by the **National Lottery Community Fund**.




People for Play campaign workshop and picnic

People interested in campaigning for better play provision in their local areas came to this workshop at Coram's Fields on a very hot September day.

Fledgling campaigners heard from a group of residents leading the transformation of Finchley's Market Place Playground and other successful play activists; and shared experiences, challenges, tips and inspiration with one another.

Outside, playworkers were on hand with a pile of junk and loose parts for children and family members to become immersed in - before everyone came together for a picnic. The event was part of the **Communities United for Play** project, funded by **Trust for London.** Working alongside activist groups London Play is creating an online play campaign toolbox to support future play campaigners.

London Play goes to Seoul!

London Play went to South Korea in October! Invited by the organisers of a new conference looking at 'content' shaping children's lives, we were part of a small subgroup of contributors dedicated to promoting hands on, process-not-outcome focused, child-led, loose parts, creative play. The play community in Seoul is small but passionate, in a culture where kids are under immense pressure to compete and succeed academically - no doubt to the detriment of their mental wellbeing.





London Play was commissioned by the **Mayor** of London and **Transport for London** to inspire and support people across the capital to try out a play street over **Car Free Day** weekend in September. Despite a late start to the campaign more than 10,000 people in 18 boroughs transformed over 100 streets into playful community spaces. In doing so they reclaimed the equivalent of 22 football pitches and gifted children 22,000 hours of extra playtime.

The London Play team also ran a spacehopper race zone at **Great Ormond Street Hospital**'s play street. The following day we transformed Lewisham's **Deptford High Street** with just a few cardboard boxes and loose parts, a bit of chalk (and more spacehoppers), showcasing the potential for streets to become playful community spaces when cars are less dominant.

Go Kart Build and Race events to return in 2024

London Play's famous Go Kart Build and Race events have had to go a bit off-piste since the pandemic hit. For two years we went mobile, taking kart making to adventure playgrounds with 'Together A-Kart'; and 2021's Formula Fun saw kids in karts take over central London streets. We are delighted to share that we have been awarded funding from the Barbara Ward Children's Foundation to help support the next three annual events - and hope to return to Mudchute Farm in summer 2024

But it will not be the same without our great friend and colleague, Peter Wright (pictured, right), who sadly died in the summer. Many will know that Peter was chief engineer for all our go kart events for many years. He was also a meticulous organiser of our tools; and a great friend who is dearly missed.

Our Royal Park-nership

Our **Play in the Park** initiative with **The Royal Parks (TRP)** came to an end early in the year. London Play worked to engage children, young people and families living near newly built playgrounds in Greenwich Park and The Regent's Park through outreach, public events and working with schools, to ensure that they benefit fully from these wonderful public play areas. The impact report showed that over nearly four years, (with a gap in the middle during Covid) more than 6,500 people attended events and play sessions in the parks, 3,800 of whom were children.

Our partnership with TRP will endure and we continue to work together where possible to promote and support more and better play opportunities in some of London's most iconic parks. In August a 'Not back to School' picnic in Greenwich Park was attended by families including children with additional needs. And keep a lookout for adventure on the high seas in 2024!
